power house at about 0640, cutting off ell lights and eilencing the Group radio. Auxiliary power was soon turned on at the radio station and the C.P.

Bombing cessed at about 0604 but several Zero Fighters steyed over the field strafing occasionally, and raising "Marry Hell" in general. During this period two of our fighters attempted to land. One landed without suffering further damage, the other attempted to get on a Zero Fighter, also circling the field, and was shot down by a Second Zero Fighter. Observers were amazed at the acceleration of this Zero Fighter. The FZA was apparently using full throttle but the Zero closed the range like the FZA was atanding still. All enemy aircraft departed EASTERN ISLAND about 0715 and a massage was broadcast "Fighters land, refuel by division, 5th division first." No answer was received although the message was broadcast repeatedly, so a message "All fighters land and reservice" was broadcast several times. A citifully few fighters returned in answer to this message, and it was strongly suspected that there were no more to land.

When the passessment of demayes showed that several enlisted VF and VS had been killed by bombs. Four VHF-221 ordnance men working in a VF rearming pit were killed when a 500% bomb hit the exact center of the pit, exploding, and also emploding 8-100% bombs in the ready locker. One solitional VF anlisted was killed during the bombing of the power-house. VMSB lost one man when a bomb struck near the VMSB engineering tent.

First reports showed casualties to sviators and gunners as listed in the attached squadron lists, plus Captain Blain and Corporal McFeely for VMSD-241 and Captain Perrill for VMF-221. These people were rescued later in the battle. Merrill, within a few minutes of his parachute landing in the lagoon, and Blain and McFeely at about 1000 June 8th.

TMF-221 reported 1 F2A and 1 F4F in combetteondition, and one more Tiyable but wheels would not retract. MATE-241 reported 3 SBD's and 8 B2U's in commission.

each, acstly dive bombers or level bombers, with a small proportion, 3 or 4, Zero Fighters. The grand total was approximately 20 enemy sirplanes. What losses the missing ones inflicted is not known, yet surviving cilots cannot recopcile the small number of bombs dropped with the number of enemy bombers in sight then the initial contact was made. These pilots state that there must have been at least three 27 plane formations in sight at one time at the scene of conflict. These were exclusive of the exarms of Zero Fighters which must have been operating between 20,000 and 50,000 feet. It is a growing opinion that the Japs lost 40 to Sacraft by VKF-221 action alone.
